

Ferrari Brain with Bicycle Brakes

On Wednesday, November 11, thanks to the Cheder, I was zoche to be able to hear from one of the world's experts on the topic of ADD/ADHD. His name is Dr. Edward M. Hallowell. One of his best -selling books is "Driven to Distraction." Dr. Hallowell began by saying that this is not a new condition to the world. This has existed for hundreds of years. These were the kids who were always tortured in school. They were put down, hurt, ridiculed, belittled, and simply cast away for being the black sheep. They are the children who can't focus, who just can't be like everyone else, who were always out of the box, physically and emotionally. This condition was always looked at through the lens of "morality" and these kids were not making the moral scale.

In 1937 a lot changed in this field. Dr. Bradley conducted an experiment where he administered medication to children who were under his care. These children were all thrown out of their schools for misbehavior or what have you. He gave them an amphetamine and he saw a change in 20 minutes. What this told the world was that attention challenges was a neurological problem: there was an issue with the brain. It was later discovered that the specific area is in the frontal lobe (where much executive functioning takes place). Now it was able to be looked at through the medical lens as opposed to

the moral lens. There is only one problem with the medical model. One only goes to the doctor when he/she is sick, in this case a "sick" mind. The real problem with this approach is that now it becomes a disorder (as stated in the diagnosis: ADD attention deficit disorder). We are creating a crippled society, and this is a negative, a disability, a disorder. The doctor's are the ones doing this; they are the ones labeling this disorder.

Dr. Hallowell went on to explain that it really shouldn't be this way. The real and only cripple is if you believe in yourself that you are less, any less capable at all. Dr. Hallowell told us about someone who is a very close personal friend of his. His name is David Neeleman. He doesn't think much of himself at all. He feels he is no good because that is what he was told repeatedly growing up. However, in reality he is quite smart and ambitious. He began working at Southwest Airlines and he continuously worked his way up. He was doing so well in the company that his colleagues became increasingly jealous of him and eventually had him fired. He decided to open up his own airline and founded.....JetBlue. He also was the one who invented the e-ticket and screens behind airline seats. However, he is not happy with himself and it's quite sad.

The extreme opposite is Dr. Hallowell himself who does have the condition of ADD. He recalls that

in first grade when he was having an extremely hard time learning how to read and write, his teacher would sit next to him and wrap her arm around him and embrace him instead of pushing him away. He attributes all his success to his teachers and to that one specifically even more. Dr. Hallowell is on a mission to prevent this negativity. To people who have ADD we need to say "congratulations!" I have great news for you! You have a great brain! You have a Ferrari brain, it's just that it has bicycle brakes; which of course can be very dangerous, so we need to work on the brakes, but that's all. We tell them that we can fix their brakes!! We need to embrace the model that it is not a deficit, it is a strength. It's not a deficit, it's a wanderer, he is just elsewhere, not nowhere!

Yes, we may need to medicate children to help out those brakes and become very influential and successful people, and help them fulfill their potential. However, this is in no way the be all and end all. They need a lot of positive; they also need connection. The term ADD is ridiculous, it's misleading, as it is not a deficit. We need to reframe it; a Ferrari brain with bicycle brakes.

What does this condition look like? People with it tend to be pioneers, innovative, curious, creative, strong-willed, out of the box, with a sixth sense of intuition. All this is great, but what gets in the way is the inconsistent focus. They

can hyper-focus or not focus at all, which leads to inconsistent performance and unexplained under achievement, trouble with executive functioning such as organization.

In the world of ADD there is no time. There are only two time's that exist," now" and "not now". If today is Wednesday and the test is Friday, then it's not now!! When they study right before, they have a rush of adrenalin which is nature's form of medication, it's nature's stimulant. Impulsive does not have to be bad, that is creativity. You can't say to yourself "I think I will come up with a fantastic idea this afternoon at 5:33 p.m.!" They tend to have many projects in their minds, all going on at once. They worry a lot. Substance abuse and compulsive behavior will sometimes be found in ADD people.

Contrary to what people may say, there is no test to diagnose for ADD. None at all. The history, what has been going on with the child, is the best test. The teachers are extremely instrumental.

What do we do about it? The most important thing is to get educated. Read up and do research. We need to have a strength-based approach. It is a gift. Give the child a context of positivity. The classroom ambiance needs to be without any shame and fear. Don't use power or control. Rules need to very clear and very simple. Structure is critical for any student but even more so for the ADD child; clear,

consistent structure. Consistency is key. High on trust, low on fear. Excluding them should be an absolute last resort.

Medication is the most controversial part, but it really shouldn't be, explained Dr. Hallowell. It has been around for 80 years and there is lot of data on the subject. When it works, (and it doesn't always), it works like eye glasses. It doesn't make a person smarter, only seem smarter. They can focus so there is improved efficiency, improved performance, improved organization etc.

What about the side effects? he asks. They are all completely controllable, there shouldn't be any at all, except appetite loss, so make sure they eat a hearty breakfast! "There is nothing to lose and everything to gain". What about the side effects of not taking the medication asks Dr. Hallowell. How will the child turn out?

With regard to growth stunting, the child can be off the medications weekends and summer. Statistics show that there is only half inch growth stunt and only in five percent of children on medication. As a general rule, medication will only work about 80% of the time. One needs to give the medication an adequate trial. There is no such thing as one size fits all. Some may work for some people and some for others. Each stimulant is different and each person is different.

There is much much more than

medication. There are relationships, there is connection. It was tremendous Kiddush Hashem when Dr. Hallowell said that he would talk to us all about connection but he really doesn't need to. He knows the that Jewish community has it all right here. We understand the power of connection, that is what we do all Sabbath long. Unfortunately, technology has created such a connection through our devices that it took away our personal emotional connection and this is what really will help any person and especially the ADD person thrive. He highly recommends to use "circle time" in class as a time to connect, to discuss.

We all need vitamin C, the vitamin of Connectivity. They did studies with many children and asked two questions: Do you feel connected at school? Do you feel connected at home? The ones who answered yes to both were better off than the ones who answered yes to only one and those were far better off than the children who answered no to both. Connection is a very powerful tool. Connect to family, to friends, to spirituality (as he put it), to special places, to special activities, to organizations (shuls!).

Education on the topic is the most important. It is really the most important thing we need to do before we make any decision. Do research and make an informed decision. I wish you much hatzlacha and nachas from your children.
