Our Budding Scientists

Tuesday's school wide Science Fair was the culmination of weeks of work in the classrooms. The students learned about select topics in Biology, Earth Science, Physical Science, and Space and Technology. Then,

each student chose specific area of research within the context of the class topic for the fair. In teacher guided fashion, each boy read wrote and about his



research. Each boy built a model and a poster to depict what he had learned. Additionally, each boy learned the Torah connection to each and every scientific topic studied.

The first graders created sculptures out of recyclable materials. They learned about conservation, and wrote a paragraph about their project. They also learned a happy song to encourage them to apply the concepts. The second grade learned about where different animals live, how they breathe, what they eat, and how long they live. They each researched different animals, and created dioramas of their animals. The third grade learned about the Solar system. Each boy studied a different planet and wrote a report. They arranged their classroom to depict the solar system, and the planets sunk down proportionately to size. (Yes, they did the math together in class!) The fourth grade learned about

magnets and electricity. They learned about protons, electrons and neutrons. They learned about positive and negative charges, as well as how magnets work. The fifth grade studied body systems. Each student cre-

ated model of one of the systems: Respiratory, Circulatory, Digestive, and Skeletal. Theyknow about all the ma-

jor organs and their functions, in addition to fun factoids. The sixth grade constructed simple machines, and explained how they make work more efficient; practically, and mathematically.

Aside from learning the science, the boys learned about *Bal Tash-chis* (recycling 1st grade), about

magnets were used to support David HaMelech's crown (electricity and magnetism 4th grade), Tefillos that relate to different body parts and functions (body systems 5th grade), and how simple machines were used in the Mishkan and Bais Hamikdosh (simple machines 6th grade). In an integrated curricular fashion, both the teachers and



Rebbeim were involved in this learning process.

This fair was unlike many other school fairs where the students (read: their parents) compete for the most sophisticated pro-

iect. What made this fair unique is that the projects were done in school by your son. Perhaps the most important lesson to take home from all this, is that

of empowering our children to be active learners, to enjoy the inquisitive learning process, and to be proud of their work product.

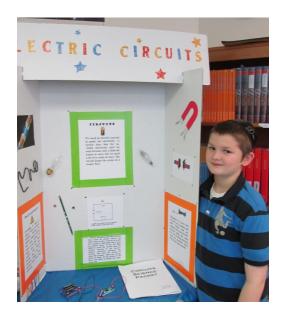

Creating A Peaceful Environment for Your Child (and YOU!)

Observations from a Parent and Mechaneches

Tip #4- Slow and Steady

Change usually does not happen overnight, we are looking for steady progress. This is true for your child and this is true for you as well. Unless your child is in danger or is endangering others or their property, don't necessarily try to stop the behavior immediately. We need to set realistic expectations.

Using the example in the previous tip (speaking too loudly), if you use a special touch to help modulate a child's voice you might need to remind him quite a few times. Tap on the child's shoulder and say, "Do you remember what that sign means?" Praise the child when they do get it because we build on positive experiences of change. Think carefully before you implement a plan of action, get advice and listen to what your intuition is telling you.

Tip #5- Showing your child respect and validation

Our choice of words is so important. Even when we need to convey to a child that they have made a choice which we do not allow, we should use words that also express our confidence that he/she can make better choices, ones which are more sensitive or responsible and reflect our values. Children have a hard time living with disappointment and disapproval, so try to stay away from strong and overt expressions of those negative feelings. Instead, let the child know you understand why they might make the wrong choice, explain why it is wrong and tell them how proud you will be when he/she makes the right decision. Leave the path open to positive change; tell your child that all of us are always growing and moving forward.

Build on success; look for the good decisions, choices and actions that your child makes and praise them with specific and descriptive praise that is real. Don't say, "Good choice, Basya!;" that's too general. Instead use, "That was such a caring way to speak" or "That was a very sensitive action," which tell what you like about their action. Besides being more focused and providing valuable feedback, this works to improve a child's vocabulary and language skills.

Tip #6- Handling a tantrum

When confronted with a child's tantrum – especially in an embarrassing location – most mothers tend to follow the path of least resistance. Often this is a poor decision on mother's part; to avoid being put in a very compromised and difficult position. Take a step back and look at your short-term and long-term goals. Even better, do some planning with them in mind.

Your short term goal is to accomplish whatever specific task – banking, shopping, or other errand – you set out to do. Now your child is making things difficult. You will need to immediately assess two questions: 1) Is my child's problem really what they are expressing (are they hungry/thirsty/tired) or is the problem something else (bored/attention -needy)? And 2) Can this task be done at another time?

Obviously, if your child has a compelling physical or emotional need, it must be addressed. A small child cannot be taught priorities and to "hold off" when they have a real need; too many bad lessons may be learned this way ("I'm not important," "I don't have to care about others"). Even where you have tried to do the planning fed the children and taken them to the bathroom before the outing, taken their special toy... - things come up with young children and you may have to give up your plans or prepare to repair the damage afterwards.

In the longer term you need to anticipate what your child will experience and demand on this trip. No one knows your child like you do; if you know that your child is a "wanter and whiner" ("I waaaaant!!!") then you should talk before you go and explain specific consequences for specific behaviors. "If you see something you want and you whine about it, then....will happen." BE PREPARED TO KEEP YOUR WORD (because you will be tested) and make sure to keep your inner peace. Don't become emotionally entangled with your child's tantrum! Even if you leave a full cart and waste an hour or more's worth of shopping, you are teaching your child a lesson about your integrity and your strenath. Your word needs to stand or you are sending a mixed message to your child. Also, for good chinuch, never respond to the people

Tip #7- Relax together as a family

One of my most pleasurable moments as a parent: Friday night after the meal looking around the living room as my husband and each of my children is reading a book, individually or in twos. The room is so peaceful, the quiet broken only by a soft laugh or a comment made to each other. We have had moments like that while working on a puzzle together as a family, or while drawing cards to send to a family member.

All children benefit from moments to relax, moments to reflect and moments of less intense sensory stimulation. In class, we actually have a game called "The Silent Game," in which we begin lunchtime with a minute of silence. This not only makes sure they eat but also gives them quiet time. Although some children could happily continue going without a mo-

ment's rest until they collapse (the Energizer Bunny-Boy), others need peaceful breaks during the day. We also do this at rest time; some children will sleep, others will choose a quiet activity to do on their mat. It gives them time to relax, recharge and reset so they can transition from one part of the day to the next. This will work for you at home, too; try a 15 minute "quiet read" (or even meditation, if you're so inclined) before dinner or before bed.
